NORTH WEST

LV= and ElectriX has teamed with Ordnance Survey (OS) to create a series of road trips around Great Britain to highlight just how many miles an electric vehicle can travel on a single charge – 250 miles. The 250-mile maps have been developed after a new study from LV= and ElectriX found that 1 in 3 (36 per cent) are put off from switching to a battery-powered car because they fear they can't travel long journeys.

This map covers some of the most scenic routes and landmarks in the North West of England. From a medieval castle and former prison to the beautiful sights of the Yorkshire Dales. These are some of the amazing destinations and landmarks you can visit in the car on one charge!

According to new research from LV= and ElectriX, 1 in 4 of us take travelling around the UK for granted, and nearly half would like to explore more of the UK than they currently do. So, pack your things and grab your road trip essentials as it's time to explore some of Great Britain's most beautiful landmarks.

You can join the route from wherever you fancy, but in order to make the most of the views and landmarks across the North West then we recommend that you start in Manchester and follow our itinerary below.

Our Weekend Itinerary:

Start your route in Manchester where you can charge up your vehicle ready for your adventurous weekend visiting the North West of England. The first stop is Manchester Cathedral which is one of fifteen Grade I listed buildings in Manchester. A highlight of the building is the beautiful post-war stained-glass windows.

You can then start your journey by heading north towards Preston where stop off at Turbary Woods to visit its collection of over 90 birds of prey including eagles, hawks, falcons, owls and more unusual species.

Next, head towards Lancaster to visit one of the country's best-preserved castles where you can learn about England's dark history, with tales of persecution, incarceration, punishment and execution. After a couple of hours in the car you might want to grab some food and take a comfort break too.



It'll then be time to make your way towards the Yorkshire Dales. After a fun-packed day, we recommend booking yourself into a nearby hotel or bed and breakfast to rest up before day two of your adventure.

Your morning will begin with a drive around the Yorkshire Dales, driving through its picturesque scenery and stopping off at famous landmarks such as Ribbleshead Viaduct, Aysgarth Falls and Malham Cove. As you begin to head back south towards Manchester, we recommend stopping off at Bingley to visit the Five Rise Locks and then onto Cartwright Hall in Bradford for an afternoon of art before your adventure comes to an end.
